



Reception/Year 1

What a fantastic fortnight we have had in Jasper and Gruffalo classes!! Our reception children completed their first week of eating in the school hall and also stayed for their very first full day – all with big smiles and lots of fun! Our Year 1 children have been extremely helpful in showing them what to do and have set a great example for them with our school rules and routines.

We were very excited and a little confused when we noticed that some of our toy animals had escaped from the classroom and got stuck at the bottom of a hole in our outside area! We thought about all the different ways in which we could help them get out and are looking forward to learning our new Talk 4 Writing text, 'Stuck in the mud'.

Our Year 1 History topic this term is very poignant, as it is all about comparing the life of Queen Elizabeth II to Queen Victoria. We spoke with our Year 1 children about what a Queen's job is, and how she helps decide on rules to keep the country safe. The children came up with their own rules that they felt were important and then designed their own flags that they would have if they got to be the ruler of their very own country.








Year 1/Year 2


The children in Year 1 and 2 have made a fantastic start in their Talk For Writing sequence: Jack and the Beanstalk. As part of our writing unit, we have looked at using adventurous vocabulary, creating noun phrases and using the five senses to describe a setting.

After her majesty's funeral on Monday, we thought about how we can use these skills to describe historic events too. During the funeral we could see 'smart soldiers marching' and 'an enormous castle' and we could hear 'loud drums' and 'beautiful singing'. Take a look at some of our colouring too.









Year 3

In light of the passing of Queen Elizabeth, Year 3 has talked about her importance to the country and the Commonwealth. We looked at her family tree to see who will be our future kings and discussed who reigned before her. We also had a think about when and how she has had to overcome change throughout her 70 years of reign and reflected in our own lives on how we could support others to overcome change in their lives, such as moving to a new school or moving house.

Year 3 have had an excellent week starting our new topic of forces and magnets in Science and continuing our work of place values in Maths.

In English, we have started to look at character descriptions and how can use expanded noun phrases to make our writing more interesting.







Year 4

The sad news of the death of Queen Elizabeth II and her subsequent funeral was well respected within our Year 4 classes. It has given us the opportunity to discuss how we can help to support others when they may have to overcome changes in their lives. Many pupils discussed how the recent events brought back memories of loved ones. We discussed the importance of making space in the day for thinking about important people in our lives and how our learning can also provide a welcome distraction from these thoughts.

In Year 4, we have managed to fit in lots of new learning opportunities around the Bank Holiday. Exploring 'Voices in the Park' and gaining an understanding of different people's perceptions on the same event has been a highlight this week. We are now writing a sequel.

In Maths, we have continued to explore the important concept of place value and we have all continued to enjoy our ukulele lessons!







Year 5

What a start to Year 5, we have been super busy and it has been fantastic getting to know you all.

Hearing the sad news in regards to the Queen's passing on 8/09/2022, we have, as a cohort, had various discussions about the Queen's reign, as well as discussing what mourning means and how King Charles III will transition to King. The children have enjoyed learning about this, and have contributed to our discussions in a mature manner.

In English, we have made a start on our quest and journey tale. This week, the children have looked at relative pronouns and the importance of using 'show not tell' in our writing. The children have then used these important language features to write their own short burst and we have been blown away.

In Maths, we carry on with our place value unit and we have been working with numbers up to 1,000,000. The children have shown resilience towards this unit and produced some fantastic work.

In Science, we have begun to look at Space. We had a very exciting visitor this week from Doctor David Wilkinson, who is an Astrophysics Scientist. He spoke to us about all things space, including lots about Galaxies, The Black Hole and all the stars around. We were all fascinated and it gave us a lot of knowledge and answered lots of our questions.

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Year 6

Following on from the death and funeral of HRH Queen Elizabeth II, we have been exploring the theme of loss and change in Year 6. They have come up with some thoughtful and caring advice for those dealing with big changes in life:

Our Year 6 children showed tremendous resilience and determination towards their assessments last week; we are really impressed by their overall attitude to learning.

In Maths, we have been developing an in depth understanding of Place Value and will be moving onto the Four Operations next week. I



n English, we are identifying and using a range of features within suspense writing; the children have enjoyed using figurative language - personification and pathetic fallacy - to enhance their writing and build tension for the reader. We will be moving onto the innovate stage of our Hansel and Gretel text this week. We are currently reading 'Rooftoppers' by Katherine Rundell as part of Guided Reading, the children are making fantastic predictions and inferences about the characters. We have been able to understand a range of new vocabulary and investigate a wide range of collective nouns - see if your children can remember any of these.

In Science, we are continuing to investigate the heart and circulatory system. The children were particularly interested by the chambers and the four main components of blood including their role within the body.

Our Victorian History work has involved understanding the key changes in crime and punishment throughout the ages.

Finally, the children have created some amazing artwork based on Picasso for our Year 6 display boards.
