

Attendance

As you are aware, there is a national campaign to improve school attendance and is also a key priority within our school. We are currently on 95.5% - which has dipped since last half-term and is just below our target of 96%.

Should your child fall behind the school's expectations a monitoring process is triggered, and we may ask you to come into school to discuss your child's attendance with us. Online Safety Update - Safer Internet Day

Tips for keeping safe online


Research launched for Safer Internet Day reveals that young people are excited about changes in online technology but express the need for conversation and better support.

The research found that three quarters (74%) of parents and carers, and just under half (45%) of children have worries about safety as developments with artificial intelligence (AI), virtual reality (VR) and new social media apps continue to accelerate.

It found that 80% of children and young people think that young people should be listened to more about changes in technology, such as how it can remain safe.

The research also reveals low awareness of the Online Safety Act, a new law which prioritises the safety of children online and places new duties on social media companies around the content shared on their platforms.

To feel more knowledgeable in how you can support your child to stay safe and happy online, the UK Safer Internet Centre have put together a <u>guide</u>.

Our theme for Nursery is 'fantasy' this term!

The children have been having fun with all things fantasy - we've had Wizards, Pirates, Fairies, Knights/castles/Aliens/ Unicorns and Dragons.

We've explored the seven seas and created Pirate ships - this painting helps us develop and improve our muscles for writing.

The children then travelled into space, where we talked about 'Aliens' and where they might live! Some children were interested about the planet we live on. We had lots of rockets and space themed toys for them to pretend to be a 'spaceman'. The ladies put out some green jelly in a tray - this felt all slimy and cold, one child even tasted it! 'Umm it tastes yummy'!

For the last week before half term, we asked the children to come in, in their favourite costume from home! We had, Pirates, Princesses, Mermaids, Paw patrols, Ballerina's, Elsa's/Anna's, Butterflies, Fairies and a Tiger! Wow they all looked great!

And lastly this week - we are learning about Chinese New Year! Reception

The Reception children have been busy this term! In our learning about 'Understanding The World' we have been finding out about what it is like to live in the Arctic. We have found the Arctic on the globe and looked at how far away it is from where we live. We have used picture books and non-fiction texts to find out about the animals that live there. The children have talked about what is similar and what is different to life here in the UK.

In our Literacy work we have been learning about 'The Three Billy Goats Gruff' and have looked at instructions. We sequenced instructions for how to brush your teeth. We wrote a list of fillings you would need to make sandwiches. The next day we made sandwiches and the children really enjoyed having a sandwich picnic outside!







Year 1

We cannot believe this is the last week of this half term, where is the time going?! We have had an amazing half term and we are over the moon with the progress our Year 1's have made.

In English, we have finished our fiction topic on The Magic Porridge Pot and the children's innovated stories were fantastic to read. They took the layout of the original story and really used their imaginations to make it their own! It was wonderful to see them put their learning into practise with them using a variety of verbs, speech verbs, similes and descriptions of settings using their senses to describe! They are really building their toolkits now for good story telling features!

In Maths, we finished our place value to 20 topic and began addition and subtraction within 20. So far, we have looked at how our number bonds to 10 can help us with our number bonds to 20, we have looked at doubles and using these to find near doubles too. This topic will continue in the next half term.

We have also finished all of the topics in our foundation subjects, including animals in Science, drawing in Art, explorers in History and technology around us in Computing. We can't wait to begin our new topics next half term.

Year 2/3

We have been super busy in year 2/3 and the children have all worked hard to complete their science unit on the human body. To show off all their fantastic learning they have created posters which explain how the human body works including the organs, skeleton and muscles and joints. It has been a topic they seem to have really enjoyed. After half term we will be looking at the life cycle of plants.

In English we have been getting to know the structure of instructional texts and how to use 'bossy' verbs to make commands. The children have had opportunities to write our own sets of instructions for various things including recipes for their sandwiches, cereal and making up their own playground games.

In maths the children have been focusing on multiplication and division. So far, they have learned lots about arrays and grouping to make equal amounts. The children have all been practicing their times tables recall too. We will be continuing division and multiplication after half term.

Year 4

After writing their discussion texts, the children have now been exploring newspaper reports, where they have been brilliant in identifying key features and have begun to write their own. From super strikers to disco dancers, their newspaper reports certainly will stand out in the Wellesley News!

The children have absolutely loved 'The Wild Robot' (to the point we have purchased the sequels in class!) with lots of positive reviews. The book had the children on a rollercoaster of emotions from laughs to even some tears at the ending, but safe to say it is a year group favourite!

In maths, we have been exploring the perimeter of polygons where the children have shown fantastic reasoning in their explanations to one another. To finish the half-term off, we have had our practise MTC test and we have been blown away by the children's continuous rapid progress; it is clear to see how had each child works both at school and at home.

As promised, with such an engagement into our Roman topic, the children made their own shields, following their designs. While in the drill square, they followed the commands perfectly and moved into each of the 3 formations we have studied. Safe to say they made truly fierce soldiers!



Year 5

Wow! We can't believe we are already half way through the spring term. Year 5 have had a great few weeks, and have shown huge progress across all of their subjects.

In maths, we have come to the end of our unit on fractions, all the children have progressed wonderfully and it's been lovely to see their confidence grow, next term we will begin our unit on decimals and percentages. Remember to keep practising your times tables year 5!

In English we are half way through our focus on newspaper reports. The children have so many fantastic ideas and we can't wait to read their own newspaper reports in the next couple of weeks.

We have come to the end of our History unit, the Tudors, year 5 have really enjoyed this topic, especially acting out the 'War of the Roses'.

In DT the children have been designing and making their own sculptures out of clay, they are all absolutely fantastic and year 5 should be very proud of themselves!

Attenborough and Spruce class have thoroughly enjoyed forest school this half term, especially the s'mores and hot chocolate! Darwin will be having forest school during spring 2.

Year 6

This half-term seems to have gone very quickly! Our Year 6s should feel very proud of what they have achieved so far in this their final year at WP! In particular, they should be proud of the determination and resilience they have shown this week which has been our Assessment Week. The children have been able to demonstrate through the assessments the areas of learning which they fully understand and the areas which we will be addressing in order to get them fully prepared for SATs week in May and their onwards transition to Secondary School.

In Maths, we have begun our fascinating Algebra unit. The children have been getting to grips with formula, equations and expressions. In Guided Reading, we are continuing our novel by the talented David Almond - Skellig. We have been analysing symbolism within the text along with the developing themes and character - we can't wait to find out what happens next!

In English, we are nearing the end of our Non-Fiction unit on Newspapers and in R.E. our Christianity unit has led us to consider a number of Christian stories relevant to salvation to include The Easter Story. In Geography our work on West Africa continues with the children exploring the diverse culture of the area alongside its physical and human geography.

Finally, in P.E. the children have had an amazing time putting together their gymnastic skills, working in teams to produce some fantastic displays!
