Important Facts

- The English Civil War was a series of battles fought between 1642 and 1651. On one side were supporters of the king (Charles I) and on the other were supporters of Parliament (led by Oliver Cromwell). The Civil War resulted in the execution of Charles followed by 11 years of a commonwealth, when England had no monarch.
- The <u>Siege</u> of Taunton occurred during the <u>English Civil War</u>. In <u>1645</u> Parliamentary forces commanded by Colonel <u>Robert</u> <u>Blake</u> were besieged in <u>Taunton</u>, the only Parliamentary <u>enclave</u> in the South West of the country. A relief column under <u>Colonel Ralph</u> <u>Weldon</u> made it to Taunton on <u>May 11</u>, but the combined forces were still besieged. The two generals held out until help arrived on <u>June</u> <u>14</u> after the troops could be spared from the <u>Battle of Naseby</u>.
- Blake famously declared that he had four pairs of boots and would eat three pairs before he would surrender.
